While at Microsoft, he made a name for himself as a leader who is passionate about preparing for the workplace of the future and helping to create the next generation of entrepreneurs, innovators, inventors, and business leaders, while also

focusing on finding ways to leverage technology to build a more sustainable economy for South Africa.

He has a reputation for building high-performing teams. He brings deep practitioner insight and understanding of how to re-skill and transform workforces across a range of industries to embrace the modern workplace.
